January 2022 Wrap Up 2021

Creativity. Flexibility. Perseverance. These are the words I use to describe Faith UMC in 2021. In the midst of denominational conflict and worldwide pandemic – our church family found creative ways to carry on the ministry of Jesus Christ.

Creativity – In 2021, Faith took huge steps in our online ministry. We updated software and hardware. We trained and retrained our AV team. Most importantly, in July 2021, we hired Rev. Josh Bailey-Green as our Director of Audio-Visual and Web Ministries, who will help us develop these areas of ministry. Every now and then, homebound (or mobility challenged) members ask me if we're going to stop livestreaming services once the pandemic ends. I respond that online ministry is one of the ways we connect with members and reach out into the mission field. I assure them that we will continue this vital ministry. In 2021, the pandemic forced us to adjust how we did ministry. After a year of no VBS (in 2020), Miss Kim developed the "Super Spy Kids Take-Home Vacation Bible School" this summer. This winter, Miss Kim moved Santa outside for a second year of "Santa Drive Thru" to safely bless children and families in our congregation and local community.

Of course, the challenges also impacted ministries with adults. Many adults were disconnected and isolated from everyone else since March 2020. In response, Faith prepared (and delivered) Christmas packages to our entire church family in 2020. This included fun goodies (like reindeer food) but also communion elements. This Easter (2021), we delivered Easter packages to our entire church family. This time, packages included items such as handmade crosses, jellybeans, and communion elements.

Flexibility – One of the biggest challenges of 2021 was adjusting to the reappointment of Pastor Caitlyn in July. In addition to overseeing youth ministry and congregational care, Pastor Caitlyn was a regular preacher and worship leader. Our Staff Pastor Parish Committee worked hard over the past year to reconfigure our church staff team. On July 1, they hired Rev. Josh Bailey-Green as our Director of AV & Web Ministries. At the same time, they reconfigured the job description for Miss Kim (our Director of Children's Ministry) and hired her as our new Director of Family Ministry, which includes youth ministry. On November 1, Faith hired Dr. Jim Sandberg as our Director of Congregational Care.

In addition to these planned staff changes, there was more work for the SPPRC to do. In September, our SPPRC expanded the job description of Beth Ridderhoff (our Director of Contemporary Worship) to include organist/choir accompanist responsibilities. As of mid-September, Beth's new title is Director of Music Ministry. Currently, the SPPRC is working to hire a new Office Manager. Thank you to our amazing SPPRC for your flexibility and faithfulness this past year.

Perseverance – It has been challenging and tiring year. Many of us (including myself) are physically, mentally, and spiritually drained. However, we found ways to persevere and adjust to our ever-changing circumstances. We

have helped each other keep our eyes focused on Jesus and his call to love God and serve one another. Throughout the year, our Church Council and Safety Team guided us in the ways we can safely reopen our facility and restart ministries. It's been a series of two steps forward and one step back, but Faith has always kept our church family's physical health and well-being as our top priority.

As a result, we've experienced unexpected blessings in the midst of the pandemic. For example, we had a lot of baptism. Specifically, we baptized 16 infants & children from November 2020 to November 2021! We baptized babies in our Memorial Garden. We baptized twins in a family's home. The other baptisms were in the sanctuary after Sunday morning services.

All baptisms were livestreamed. All baptisms were shown in worship services the following weekend so that the congregation could take our vows to love and nourish the faith of little ones.

On Sunday, January 2, we'll gather @ 10:00 AM for a Wesleyan Covenant Service renewing our commitment as followers of Jesus Christ.



On Sunday, January 2, we will gather for a single worship service at 10:00 AM. Please note these special worship times on your calendar.






I was reading a daily devotional from "Mornings With Jesus". As I read it, I realized that it is just the type of love and support that the United Methodist Women is often known for.

Lay Member to Annual Conference Report - 2021

The 182nd Northern IL Annual Conference was held virtually on July 16 -17.

I was one of 3 lay delegates representing Faith UMC. A special Laity Session was held on July 15. During that session, we heard about the joys of individual churches such as: the establishment of a Racial Justice Team in Schaumburg, a new church building in Minooka, and Intentional Discipleship programs in Franklin Park and Chicago (Urban Village). Break - out sessions allowed us to meet some of the laity and our District Superintendent, Jacques Conway, from our new Lake South region.

The Plenary sections of both days included voting on several pieces of legislation, Bible study with Bishop Julius Trimble stressed an "attitude of gratitude", viewing videos on topics such as UMCOR, global health, deacons, Midwest Missions, and Church and Society. The videos showed how widespread and involved in the world the United Methodist Church continued to be – even through the pandemic. Our interim Bishop, John Hopkins, delivered his Episcopal Address in 2 parts. He spoke about local churches and their front-line ministries and how the Northern IL Conference continues to take a strong stand on equity and justice for all. The future of the NIC and the possibility of merging with another Conference was touched on. He addressed his concern about a significant shift in the denomination. This year's Bishop Appeal raised over \$25,000 and went toward the UMCOR's COVID - 19 relief efforts worldwide.

Bishop Hee-Soo Jung, former NIC Bishop, delivered the message for the Memorial Service where we remembered clergy, spouses, staff, and laity who have passed in the last year, including the more than 600,000 Americans and 3.5 million worldwide who died from the Coronavirus. The Retirement Service celebrated the clergy who had retired with 362 years of service. Our own Jan Shaulis gave a heartfelt testimonial and thanked Pastor Caleb and our congregation for encouraging her in her quest for formal ministry. (Jan has been appointed from retirement to 2 churches in the northwest part of our conference.)

Ordination did not occur during the Conference but will take place on Oct. 1. We will reconvene on Oct. 2 via Zoom to address the budget for 2022 and nominations. Meeting virtually is obviously not the same as meeting in person. I missed the sharing of ideas, the music and sound of hundreds of voices, and the enthusiasm generated by the passion of so many. However, much was accomplished, and I look forward to 2022 when we can meet in person.

Church Conference Report for 2021 - Lay Member to Annual Conference

The 182nd Session of the Northern Illinois Annual Conference was held on July 16 & 17 from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm on each day by Zoom presentation. The theme of this year's conference was "Jesus Makes a Way". The Conference took place in two days of business, voting, reports, Bible Study, and worship Services. For the second year COVID-19 restrictions restricted in-person meetings, making it necessary to meet virtually. A special thanks to GNTV for production assistance and Barrington UMC for hosting all those behind the scenes.

The Conference started for myself on Thursday, July 15th in an evening Zoom meeting of the Laity Session hosted by the NIC's three Co-Lay Leaders. A time for conversation and learning was presented including a breakout presentation of the leaders of each new district. Several local churches from around the conference highlighted their new and creative ministries and a tour of the NIC website with tips on finding relevant information.

The first day started after a prayer with a Bible Study presentation by Bishop Julius C. Trimble from the Indiana Conference. He encouraged an "attitude of gratitude" based on Matthew 14:13 - 21 of Jesus feeding the 5,000. After a Pre-Conference briefing Overview and a break, the standard governing motions for the conference were addressed. This included acceptance of the Historic Reports and voting on the Consent Calendar. The Consent Calendar included the closing of eight churches Beach Park: York House, Northbrook: Glenbrook Korean, Ringwood, Wood Dale: Community, Chicago: Fernwood, Lisle: Faith, Alfolkey: Bethel, and Elkhorn. A prayer was offered for these communities.

A report was given that the budget for 2022 will be based on 81% of apportionment giving at \$4.200.000.

Bishop John L. Hopkins, who came out of retirement to serve as our interim Bishop delivered the first part of his Episcopal Address. He focused on what he's perceived as the Conference's strength and challenges. "Most of the realities I have discovered are incredibly positive. For example, we have gifted and dedicated clergy and laity, we take a strong stand for equity and justice with full inclusion of everyone, our local churches are doing amazing frontline ministry, the conference's new structure under the Annual Conference Shepherding Team is streamlined and productive, and we continue to have a devotion to missions (the Northern Illinois Conference gave \$418,199 and supported 18 missionaries through the Advance in 2020)".

Bishop Hopkins addressed the reality of a continued decline in apportionment payments, concern about jurisdictional realignment of conferences (if we share a Bishop, the Northern Illinois Conference will not "merge" with another conference – at a future date two conferences can vote to merge if they desire) and concern about a significant shift in the denomination.

After a lunch break the Memorial Service was held. The message was presented by Bishop Hee-Soo Jung from the Wisconsin Conference and former NIC Bishop. He delivered a message titled, "Wreath for Your Excellent Leadership". During the Memorial Service we remembered clergy, spouses, staff, and laity who have passed in the last year, including the more than 600,000 of our fellow Americans and more than 3.5 million of our brothers and sisters worldwide who died from the Coronavirus. The day was completed with a Laity Address by the three Co-Lay Leaders and additional Legislation. A report was given that this year special Bishop's Appeal offering totaled more than \$25,000 and went toward the United Methodist Committee on Relief's COVID-19 relief effort worldwide. The second day started after a prayer with a continuation of the Bible Study led by Bishop Julius C. Trimble encouraging an "attitude of gratitude". Bishop Hopkins delivered his second Episcopal Address focusing on unity power and mission. Bishop Hopkins said "the church needs to be unified and empowered". "The church also needs to be clear about its mission: to make disciples; to love God with all our heart, and mind, and soul, and strength; and to love our neighbor as ourselves". Bishop Hopkins said it's important to equip local churches and ministry settings to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. "Our need to focus resources on the local church is not only about conference programs, budget, and strategy. It is about us" Bishop Hopkins concluded. "Can we focus our attention on the people in our communities who need to know about the God we serve? That is the shift we need to make. And that focus cannot be given over to a committee or task force. Each of us is responsible!" The Annual Conference voted on several pieces of legislation over the two days including support for marginalized communities negatively impacted by COVID-19, advocating for the rights of Palestinian children and families, humanizing criminal justice, reorganization and streamlining of the program areas in the Conference, and a revision of the standing rules to reinstate legislative sections at Annual Conference beginning in 2022. All of the legislation documents were approved except for a document on an Amendment to the Standing Rules for Consent Calendar that was disapproved by action of the Consent Calendar. The business of the Conference was concluded before lunch. I though Bishop Hopkins did an executant job conducting this Annual Conference. Keep on your calendar October 1st for the 2021 Service of Ordination and Commissioning (limited in - person, also livestreamed) and October 2nd business session (held via Zoom) to address the budget, nominations, and the United Methodist Foundation of the NIC's Annual meeting. The 2022 Annual Conference will be held June 8-9 and return in person at the Renaissance Schaumburg Hotel and Convention Center. Following a lunch break, we had the Retirement Service. This service celebrated those clergy and local pastors who have been a gift to the church, offering leadership to congregations and ministries beyond the church. Combined, this class has served 362 years. The highlights of this service were the many stories and advice given by each of the retirees.

Jim Simmons

The first session 2021 Northern Illinois Conference was held via Zoom on July 16th and 17th broadcasted from Barrington United Methodist Church with Interim Bishop John Hopkins presiding. Our church delegation included three lay members, Sandra Ward, Jim Simmons and me, Barry Barnett. I was elected to serve as a delegate from our church at the church conference in 2020 in order to present different points of view and represent the members of our congregation that hold traditional Methodist beliefs. I looked forward to having a platform to counteract the very progressive agenda of the Northern Illinois Conference. Many Methodist conferences across the United States have been in open rebellion because of the position reaffirmed in 2019 by the Special General Conference of the United Methodist Church regarding homosexuality. Normally when a General Conference passes a policy, and it is determined to be constitutional, then the appointed clergy from local pastors all the way up to the bishops are required to enforce that policy. All the policies are included in the Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

After the 2019 policy reaffirmation there has been several conferences and individual churches that have denounced the decision and some clergy have refused to enforce the policies therefore openly violating the Book of Discipline. Gay marriages have been conducted and openly gay clergy have been appointed and, in some cases, promoted. As many in our congregation are aware I support the church's position that was reaffirmed in 2019. If a church is to survive as a denomination, there must be a process for resolving issues of faith and belief. We have always had a process and, in my opinion, violations by rogue clergy and church members are unacceptable. Instead of continuing to resolve issues using proper processes, progressives have moved our denomination to the edge of a destructive schism which may have negative effects on the mission of our church both nationally and locally.

When I received the documents for our annual conference, I read them with an expectation that there would be legislation to be debated regarding our conference's positions that are in violation of the Book of Discipline. I discovered that many of the documents had been included in a "Preliminary Consent Calendar" determined by a committee in consultation with the bishop.

That calendar is presented in whole for approval or non-approval. I first learned that the only way to remove legislative documents from this calendar was to submit a petition before July 1st

way to remove legislative documents from this calendar was to submit a petition before July 1st, 2021, with at least 25 other delegate signatures. I learned this at the pre-conference orientation which took place on July 8th, 2021. I voted against the acceptance of the Preliminary Consent Calendar, but it passed by an overwhelming majority. That left only 5 legislative actions to be discussed and voted upon in session. They were: Advocating for Palestinian Children 700.09 Support for those Effected by COVID-19 700.10, Call for Jurisdictional Conference 700.11 Humanizing Criminal Justice 700.13, Revised Legislative Process 702.06

The only topic that may have enabled me to express my views regarding what is happening was 700.11 a Call for Jurisdictional Conference although I knew my remarks might be declared as not germane to the topic. I did get recognized and was able to speak but was interrupted by the Bishop for not being on topic. I pled my case and was allowed to finish my speech although it was somewhat disjointed. After I spoke the Bishop moved immediately to a vote. I voted no but the document was approved overwhelmingly. Other regular business including the multitude of issues passed in whole through use of the "Preliminary Consent Calendar" is available at the Northern Illinois Conference Website. 
SCRIP GIFT CARDS






